1. Goal Setting

- Be happy, be healthy. Everything else falls into place.
- Set short term goals. What can I achieve this week, this month? Focus on the daily immediate requirements and goals rather than the Leaving Cert.
- -Diet
- -Sleep
- -Daily class work and homework.

The Leaving Cert is a marathon not a sprint.



Battle Negative Thoughts.

- If you have a negative thought take a positive action.
- I'll never get a good Leaving Cert"....it won't happen.
- Do something to make it happen.
- Parents: Stay positive around son/daughter.

3. Procrastination: Do you procrastinate? Ask me later!!



Managing Time

- Decide what it is you really want, make sacrifices and go for it!
- Work from a daily or weekly timetable which strikes a healthy balance between your free time and homework / study.
- Work in **blocks of about 30 minutes** with short breaks in between
- Alternate between homework and study and keep similar subjects apart
- Work first, rewards later
- Be organised
- Best not to have your phone nearby unless you have to use it as a learning aid.
- Target tasks: start a piece of homework or study with a clear and realistic job in mind for each half hour block, e.g. 2 questions on the circle in Maths. You'll be much more productive as a result!

5. Control The Phone

- Be honest with yourself. Are you fully focused when you are studying or are you checking Instagram and other social media sites regularly?
- Remove the temptation. Put the phone in another room when studying or doing homework.

Digital Well-being

- Device/Phone management in school permission to use a device <u>only</u> with teacher permission.
- School policies Code of Behaviour & ICT Acceptable Usage
- Productive and not-so-productive screen time
- Don't let screen time get in the way of interacting with your family and friends, keeping on top of homework and study and getting a good night's sleep.
- Social Media interrupts our attention spans and causes us to lose track of time
- Have a family screen free time each day



- 9 months work consistently.
- No harm in a <u>little</u> stress.
- Students should organise daily and weekly reviews of study and exam material to avoid a build-up of study.
- Adequate sleep and eating well are crucial.
- Hobbies/Balance very important.
- Taking breaks, getting fresh air and exercising will help to relax and good for the brain.
- Surround yourself with a calm and positive environment.

- Don't overdo caffeine (especially energy drinks or coffee).
- Keep things in perspective. Grades are not a measure of your value as a human being, nor do they measure intelligence or creativity.
- Be realistic and do your best. Don't set goals like " 600 points or I won't be happy".

Tips to build Resilience

- We all go through **difficult times** such as falling out with a friend, poor exam results, the breakup of a relationship or living through a pandemic!
- Face the fear and do it anyway: the more we avoid or run away from stressful situations, the worse our stress can be in the long run.
- Reach out: As bad as things seem, you're not on your own -Teacher/Tutor/Year Head/Guidance Counsellor
- **Plug out**: disconnect from stress by getting away from devices and relaxing in other ways.




Tips to build Resilience

- Don't panic
- Stop
- Think Is this helpful? Will it matter in a few weeks? Should I talk to someone?
- Act -Do what you know is good for you...even when you don't feel like doing it.
- Stay positive: Things pass. What is painful today may be gone tomorrow. Remember that momentary setbacks are a part of building up resilience.
- Be grateful: gratitude helps us to overcome negative feelings.



Diet & Exercise

- Good Mood Food
- Strike a healthy balance
- Vitamin Rich Diet
- Stay hydrated but avoid energy drinks
- Get outdoors a 20min walk will help de-stress
- Music listening to your favourite music will encourage you to exercise



Sleep

- Long-term sleep deprivation can lead to increased anxiety levels.
- Go to bed at the same time each night and get up at same time every day 8½ to 9 hours later.
- Try to avoid 'sleep procrastination' or staying up much later than you should – on weekdays at least!
- Make a pre-sleep routine: plan to have 60-90 minutes to wind down somehow before bed
- Don't use your phone in bed or watch TV there

 they'll keep your mind racing and make sleep
 difficult.
- If you can avoid studying in your room do! Separating your work and sleep space will help you to relax.





Exam Well-being

- Try to take a **positive attitude** towards exams: they are signposts on your learning journey
- Simply focus on **improving over time**
- **Don't try harder, try differently**: experiment with a variety of timetables, note making styles etc. until you discover what is effective.
- Avoid situations that may provoke anxiety: talking to certain people before an exam can induce pre-exam panic.
- Learn to switch off
- Talk to teachers about exam techniques, timing, where you are on your course and what accommodations have been made for the Leaving Certificate 2025



- Do add courses to your Level 7/6 list as well as your Level 8 list; give yourself plenty of options at the offers stage.
- Do research your courses carefully, taking note of the course content and other information provided on the colleges' websites and in their prospectuses.
- Do attend open days and education events where you can ask questions about the course, the institution, campus life, etc.
- Do take note of the restrictions outlined on page 3 of the CAO Handbook.
- Do check your course choices carefully before the Change of Mind facility closes on the 1 July at 5pm.

CAO

- Don't list your courses based on assumptions about what the points are going to be or how well you think you are going to do in your examinations. Points can vary significantly year on year based on demand, supply and applicant performance.
- Don't list a course on your application higher up than the course that you really want if you get the higher preference offer you will not be offered anything lower.
- Don't apply for a course that you're not interested in just because you have the points for it.
- Don't place a course on your application if you do not meet the minimum entry requirements. This will be a wasted course choice as you will not be considered for a place if you do not meet these requirements (regardless of your points score).
- Don't leave your Level 7/6 list blank . You should spend some time researching Level 7/6 courses to give yourself plenty of options at the offers stage. Level 7/6 courses offer qualifications in their own right and most offer progression pathways into Level 8 courses.




